Principal's Message - Rev Fr Maroun Youssef

After a long holiday in which we celebrated our Patron's Feast, Saint Charbel, we are back for the second semester of the school year. I would like to wish all of Saint Charbel's parents and community members a Happy Feast Day. May Saint Charbel continue to intercede for those who seek help from God through him.

Our Patron teaches us how to deal with challenges in our lives. From an educational perspective, we can see clearly how many challenges there are in our life as parents, teachers, students, etc. especially in this period of time. History shows that this is not going to change nor will it become less of a challenge. It is an ongoing struggle and that is why we should find a way to gain and replenish our strength every day in order to continue living a good Christian life and to fulfil our tasks and our mission as good citizens of this world and of Heaven. The key to reaching this goal is through the

biggest challenge which is an "attitude change." To change our attitudes, we should refer to what Jesus commissioned us for, when He said "you are the light of the world" and "you are the salt of the earth". It sounds like Jesus is saying to His Disciples and to us: "you are the best". The meaning of this is to always try to be our best by changing how we lead our lives so that it is fruitful. To be the light of the world and the salt of the earth means we should be different, we should be something shining in this world like diamonds which we can see from afar because of their splendour. Saint Paul says in his letter to the Philippians: "you will shine in the world like bright stars because you are offering it the word of life" (2: 15). Actually, if we are carrying the Light of Jesus Christ in our lives, like we confess in the Creed, then this Light should cover us and emanate from us. This is the meaning of Jesus and Paul's words.

If we realise that we are radiant people; if we really believe in Jesus' word, this brings change to our lives automatically and our attitude changes. It is clear that our attitude determines our future; our attitude determines our status in this life whether we are content or miserable people.

An anonymous quotation says: "... Attitude to me is more important than fact. It will make or break a company, a church, a home. We cannot change what comes to us externally because it is inevitable. The only thing we can do is play on the one string we have, and that is our attitude...; I am convinced that life is 10 per cent of what happens to me and 90 per cent of how I react to it. I am in charge of my attitude".

Dear readers, our attitude towards God, others and ourselves can determine our destiny in this life and in the eternal life.

We give thanks that the monks of the LMO share in the vision of St Charbel in bringing people to a deep love of Christ.




It was a joyful start to the term with a College Awards assembly to celebrate the Semester One achievements of our students.

There has been a lot happening in the Primary School. The K-2 classrooms all received new desks over the holidays. Chess Classes

The students have loved learning strategies and challenging themselves. During each class there is a tuition session followed by practical application of skills through playing with an opponent. NSW Premier's Reading Challenge

This year our Stage 3 students have been involved in the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge. The Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students, and to enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read more and to read more widely. The students need to finalise their Reading Logs and hand them in to their class teachers immediately.

Robotics Classes

Last term we started a robotics class with a small group of Year 6 boys. The classes ran once a week and were conducted by Mr Love. Our boys had a wonderful experience learning to program a variety of robots to perform simple and complex tasks. Robotics classes will run again this term for a small group of Year 6 girls.

Our Year 5 and 6 students attended a speech this week by Internet Safety expert Brett Lee. He spoke to them about:


- Cyber bullying

You are cordially invited to our Book Week Parade on Thursday the 23rd of August at 2.00 pm - students are asked to dress up for the Book Week Theme 'Find your Treasure'. Remember creativity is the idea, not spending a lot of money hiring costumes. You will be amazed at how creative your children can be when given a little help and encouragement to express the treasures they have found in books in a costume. During the parade, awards will be handed out for the winning Book Week competition entries. Let's celebrate together the achievements of our students. If you have a chance, please also come and visit the library during Book Week to see the students' Book Week work displays, Book Week Books, class projects and student works in the library.

In celebrating Book Week, classes will be involved in a variety of activities to encourage a love of reading and enhance student literacy. This year's activities include Book Week competitions which requires students to use their imagination, creativity and personal opinions to create treasure maps, picture books, and book reviews to celebrate the world of treasure that can be found in books. Book Week competition forms will be available to students from their classroom teachers. The competition entries should be returned to the classroom teachers by Tuesday the 21st of August.

This year's Children's Book Week theme "Find your Treasure" involves students in imaginative and creative thinking, sparking lots of ideas encouraging children to express what they imagine and believe to be "treasures" they have found when reading. Find your treasure is a perfect description of the search to discover your next great book. An incredible story can feel like treasure when it speaks to you and understands the way you think and feel. But not every book is perfect for everyone. Children should never give up the hunt for a great read. The theme also captures why many people read – to escape, to dream, to reflect – to live inside someone else's mind for a while and to see and feel what they do. That's why they say reading makes you more compassionate and empathetic.


