On the 6th of September, the Year 9-12 Arabic classes visited his Excellency, Bishop Antoine-Charbel Tarabay and the Maronite College of the Holy Family in Harris Park.

The aim of this trip was to ask Bishop Tarabay very important questions about the Maronite Church and its culture in a different country and also to share our experiences with fellow Arabic students, make new friends as well as express our love for our Lebanese heritage.

In the morning, we met the Sisters from the Maronite College of the Holy Family, Sister Irene the Superior and Sister Margaret the Principal, as well as the Arabic Coordinator Mrs Safi and some of the school's Arabic students. We took part in an activity with the Arabic students answering riddles in Arabic that they had prepared for us. We were given some beautiful souvenirs to remember our visit and we had an amazing morning tea with all the students in the playground. After this, we prayed the Luminous Mysteries of the Holy Rosary in Arabic.

I enjoyed being able to share my Lebanese Maronite Catholic faith, and its deep roots with the Arabic language, with the students. Soon after, we ate lunch at the church's cafeteria with the students. Once we had finished, we went up to the Bishop's office to meet with him. I had the honour of introducing our students to him. We all had the opportunity to ask Bishop Tarabay important questions about the Maronites in Australia, and the challenges we face as a minority in a multicultural society. He answered our many questions insightfully and inspired us to remain close to our Maronite Catholic faith, ethos and traditions.

This visit was extremely enjoyable, as it gave us the opportunity to have a one on one encounter with our Bishop and we also met other Arabic students who had the same ideals. I loved being able to share my love for the Arabic language and Arabic culture with other students learning the same language. Although we all knew Arabic is one of the hardest languages to learn, we could all agree that being literate in the language had many benefits for us in the future.

The Arabic students would like to thank the Arabic Department in St Charbel's College and the Maronite College of the Holy Family for organising such a meaningful, enjoyable excursion.



Visual Arts Excursion—4 September 2018

On the 4th of September, students in Years 9 and 11 Visual Arts boarded a train to the Art Gallery of NSW to view the Archibald Prize and the Public Collections. Arriving at St James, students walked through Hyde Park stopping to view and appreciate the Fountain, bringing back memories of their Year 7 Visual Arts assignment. We then continued to the Art Gallery. The students admired the works of artists who had worked tirelessly to exhibit their work in the Archibald Prize. A favourite of the teachers was the work of Del Kathryn Barton's *Self-Portrait* and Noel Thurgate's portrait of Elizabeth Cummings. After a short recess, we then tackled with time as we wandered through the Historical Collection admiring the works of the Australian Impressionists as they documented the growing nation of Australia. After this, we continued to appreciate artworks of the 1800's, namely the religious artworks with precision and detail. Then we continued to the Modern collection where students witnessed Australian Cubist, Post-Impressionist and Surrealist works. Much fun was had in the Contemporary collection where students were able to engage with the artworks. Students explored the artwork of Ernesto Neto, *Just like drops in time, nothing* 2002, stockings suspended from the ceiling and the room filled with the aroma of spices. The work was designed to test the sensory experiences of the viewer. Students also engaged with an installation inspired by interiors and steel poles. The students sat at the tables and benches and enjoyed the experience. Afterwards, we had lunch together and caught the train home. Overall it was an immensely enjoyable day with a plenty of learning opportunities.

On the 20th of August, Year 9 and 10 Photography classes boarded a train for Newtown. When we arrived we walked the streets together to appreciate and document the mural art that is sprawled through the backstreets of Newtown. Students were able to develop their skills in composition using their cameras and capture the style of Urban Street Photography and Landscape. Students had to find an appropriate location and experiment with subject positioning, camera angles and depth of field using their DSLR camera. Year 10 students task was to find examples of degradation within the landscape and document it using their knowledge of composition, camera angles and depth of field.

Students were able to navigate the streets easily and worked in groups to get the perfect shot. An enjoyable day was shared with both classes.

A reminder to students to wear their winter uniform with their tie and correct jumper/jacket.




On the 14th of September, the Year 5 students had their Spirituality Day. The theme of the day was, "Walking in Someone Else's Shoes." The day began with a special Mass, celebrating the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross. The students then put their values into actions by learning to serve others. We had the St Vincent de Paul Society leading the day, by teaching our students how to live the Gospel message by serving Christ in the poor, with love, respect, justice, hope, joy and by working to shape a compassionate society.

The Primary school also celebrated the Feast of the Exaltation of the Glorious Cross by attending a whole school Mass. The feast marks the beginning of the season of the Glorious Cross, which is the last liturgical season of the Maronite Calendar.

The Feast originated after Saint Helen found the True Cross of Christ buried under temples in Jerusalem and brought above the ground. The cross of Jesus is a symbol that is known around the world. In the time of Jesus, the cross was used as something to punish people, but today we see the cross as a symbol of God's love being so great that He gave His life for us.

The students were reminded that the Holy Cross is the instrument of our salvation. They were also asked to light a candle to celebrate this great Feast Day and to thank Jesus for sacrificing His life for us and gifting us eternal life.
